Over the past few weeks in Matthew's Gospel, we have heard about the dangers and trials confronting the disciples as they seek to spread the Word of God in communities.

Understandably, there is an atmosphere of fear and trepidation amongst the group as they encounter opposition to their message and reluctance amongst people to hear the Word of God for what it really is. A lot of the relationships between the disciples and their families and society have been lost as they attempt to plot a new course of dialogue and prayer between God and his people.

Today's Gospel however, offers a welcome contrast for the disciples as Jesus offers them a glimpse of the fruits of their work as preachers and teachers. They will receive a prophet's reward. They will be welcomed into the homes of people just as Jesus Christ is welcomed. And those who offer them even the smallest cup of cold water to help them on their journey, will also receive a great reward. So we can sense at the very end of this chapter in Matthew's Gospel, that the trials which will most definitely come the disciples' way, will be counterbalanced by rewards that will have far greater impact. The disciples will be vulnerable like children but their future work will be dependent on trusting in God's power and presence in their lives. ■

LEARN

REFLECT

Captain Charles Plumb was a fighter pilot for the US Navy during the Vietnam war. His now infamous story will be told for generations to come.



His plane was destroyed by a surface to air missile and he spent 6 years as a Prisoner of War in a Vietnamese prison. He survived this difficult time in his life and now spends his time lecturing students on what he learnt from the experience.

One night he was sitting in a restaurant with his wife and a man comes over to his table and says, 'You're Captain Plumb. You flew fighter jets in Vietnam and you were shot down.' 'How in the world did you know that?' said Plumb. 'I packed your parachute,' says the man, 'and I guess it worked.' Plumb replied, 'It sure did. If your chute hadn't worked, I wouldn't be here today.'

When Charles Plumb tells this story to an audience, he always asks the question, 'Who's packing your parachute?' In other words, who are the people in your life that support you? Do you thank them for all they do for you? Do you even recognise who these people are? When Charles Plumb was on board the Navy ship, Pilots never spoke to the Parachute Packers. How many times had he passed him by on the ship and never said hello or thank you for the work he was doing?

Sometimes we lose sight of the people who provide us with the spiritual, emotional and physical support that helps us live our lives. Jesus opens the eyes of the disciples today to show them that God's support and love will always be a part of their lives and their mission. ■
