FIRST READING Ac 8:5-8.14-17

PRAYER AFTER COMMUNION



THE WORD

Year A • Season Colour: White • Psalter week 2



Jesus promises the disciples that he will not abandon them when he departs, but will ask the Father to send the gift of the Paraclete or Advocate.

Throughout our reading, we find the theme of love, the attitude which will allow the disciples to keep Jesus' commandments. The Paraclete will be the Spirit which communicates truth, it will be the ongoing presence of God's self-revelation in the world.

However, there is another world which does not recognise Jesus and which has responded to his revealing of his message by rejecting it and him as well. In this sense the disciples are in a different world whose centre is Jesus. There is no account of an ascension as such in the Fourth Gospel, no depicting of a physical departure: for John, the Easter/Paschal Mystery all takes place on the cross. The Cross is the means of the lifting up (ascension) of Jesus, his death, and the place of his handing over the Spirit (Pentecost). What Jesus was to his disciples and the people of his day, the Paraclete is to the worshipping community today. The earthly Jesus is no longer present, but the living, exalted Jesus is. Those who have rejected Jesus ("the world") will not be aware of his presence, but those who have put their faith and trust in him will be. Jesus has spoken frequently in the gospel about the oneness of himself and the Father, and now he speaks of the relationship between himself and the believer in similar terms, and this will be one of the results of his departing from them now. The mark of this relationship is love, and a loving commitment to Jesus through keeping his commandments.

SAY

Reverence the Lord Christ in your heart (1 Peter 3:15).

REFLECT

he gospel reading invites us to think about how Jesus is present to disciples today. In John's thought, this is through the presence of the Paraclete. In the bible, the Spirit of God is seen usually in terms of power: it is an enabling force which allows a person to carry out his or her appointed task. The Holy Spirit at Pentecost and throughout the Acts of the Apostles is depicted very much in this way. The presence of the Spirit in the Fourth Gospel is much more in the way of an indwelling: Jesus tells the disciples, you know him, he abides in you and he will be in you.

One of the key documents of the Second Vatican Council is the one on Divine Revelation and its title is "God's Word". It tells us that God's purpose in this self-revealing is to invite human beings into a relationship characterised by friendship. It is not a matter of the revealing of rules and regulations. This revelation is handed on in oral form, until it is committed to fixed written forms, and the handing on is what we call tradition. It is instructive that it is in connection with the Tradition of the Church that the Holy Spirit is most frequently mentioned. It is the Holy Spirit which enables the community to reflect on the Scriptures and to discern their meaning for today.

DO

Switch on an electrical appliance. Think about how dependent you are in your daily existence on an invisible power. We should rely on the Holy Spirit in a similar way to live a proper Christian life.



LEARN

The Tradition of the Church is what the community believes.

Customs such as liturgical forms are not part of the Tradition of the Church.

The title Paraclete really means legal assistant, advocate: it is the Johannine expression for the Holy Spirit.
