THE WORD

Year C • Season Colour: Green • Psalter Week 3



At the end of his version of the Beatitudes, Luke spoke about how the disciples should be glad when other people abuse them; in today's Gospel passage he shows Jesus telling them how to react in such cases.

The law of love is to be the bedrock of the disciples' moral code. This standard goes way beyond what might be expected; it is in fact rooted in the love of God towards human beings, the Lord who is "kind to the ungrateful and the wicked". It is not a case of virtue being its own reward; the disciples' reward will lie in thus being truly "children of the Most High", who reflect in their own lives, attitude and behaviour what the God in whom they believe is like.

Jesus tells his listeners to be "compassionate as your Father is compassionate". If they do not judge others, then God will not judge them. So it is we who set the standard for God's treatment of ourselves. If we are compassionate, if we feel involved in some way in the other person's situation and treat them accordingly, then God will be astonishingly generous towards us. What shopkeeper or merchant would force an overflowing amount of their stock on a bewildered customer? Yet that is the image Jesus gives of God's reaction to the person who forgives and refuses to judge or condemn others. The way the disciple treats others is the measure by which God will treat them.

REFLECT

ot many people will find today's Gospel reading comfortable. The usual standard, known as the 'Golden Rule' – 'Treat others as you would like them to treat you' – which we find in this extract, appears rather easier and more palatable than the demanding teaching of Jesus about loving enemies and doing good to those who hate you. Humanly speaking, that seems unreasonable.

But God and God's attitude are the norm by which we should gauge our own attitude and treatment of people. This is part of the covenant relationship which is summed up in the expression, "You will be my people and I will be your God". This relationship is not something abstract, it has to be lived out. The reason for the prophets' denouncing of the people's immoral behaviour was that it brought the Lord into disrepute among the heathen nations round about. The non-Israelite population would think, 'If this is how the people of Israel behave, what sort of God can they believe in?' It is the familiar problem about disciples not showing by their own lives the kind of Master they claim to follow. If we believe in an over-generous, loving and forgiving God, then that is the benchmark by which we should measure ourselves. The motive for living a moral life, then, would be gratitude for what God has done for us in history, on God's own initiative, in the person of Jesus, and which we celebrate in the Eucharist.

SAY

The Lord is compassion and love.

LEARN

The expression "Do not judge and you will not be judged" actually means "Do not judge and God will not judge you".

The idea of our setting the standard for God to judge us is found in the 'Our Father': "Forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us" means "Forgive us to the same extent as we forgive others".

The teaching about loving enemies is shown in action by Jesus' praying for forgiveness for his executioners at the cross.

DO

Look at the news: how much of the trouble and strife is due to people being unwilling to forgive? Ask the Lord to help you not to add to the sum total of the negative atmosphere in the world and to contribute to the positive aspects of life.
